

Works of Mercy Hours

Guidelines for grades 6th – Confirmation

The Sacrament of Confirmation “strengthens the baptized and obliges one to witness to Christ more fully in word and deed.” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church 1285*) The mission of the Catholic Church is to serve others by living a life in Christ, proclaiming the Gospel message, and modeling His life of service to others.

for just as a body without a spirit is dead, so also faith without works is dead (James 2:26)

The goal of requiring the youth to obtain a certain number of Works of Mercy Hours for Confirmation is to reinforce our responsibility of taking care of those in need and to create a heart that views service as an opportunity for us to share of our time and talents for the benefit of others.

As Catholics we are called to serve others through Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy, and the main focus at STFX for Confirmation will be on the Corporal Works of Mercy (CWM). However, Spiritual Works of Mercy (SWM) will also be considered. For example: The SWM of Praying for the living and the dead would be fulfilled by praying at an Abortion clinic. Helping at VBS, Totus Tuus or Camp Blaze would fulfill the SWM of Instructing the uninformed.

Corporal works of Mercy

Feed the hungry

Give drink to the thirsty

Shelter the homeless

Clothe the naked

Visit the sick

*Visit the imprisoned

*Bury the dead

*Note: The CWM of Visiting the imprisoned and Burying the dead may be more difficult and possibly inappropriate for the youth considering their age. However, there are people that are “imprisoned” in ways other than in a jail that may fall under this work of mercy.

The criteria for the Works of Mercy Hours are as follows:

Requirements:

A minimum of 30 hours of service before Confirmation, with at least 10 hours completed per year starting in 6th grade and continuing through to Confirmation.

The goal is to have the youth establish a habit of service over the 3 years.

Upon completion of service hours the candidates will need to complete a Works of Mercy Summary Form, which can be found in the Parish Office or online. Completed forms can be sent via e-mail or returned to the parish office for documentation.

FAQ's:

Why are they required to do Works of Mercy instead of any type of service hours?

In Matthew 25:31-46, Jesus is clear about how we are to serve each other. In focusing on the Works of Mercy, we raise the bar and challenge the youth to look beyond themselves and see the needs of others first. By requiring a more focused type of service, the hope is to change the mindset of "just get the hours done" to fulfill a requirement for Confirmation. Also to help promote a spirit of gratitude for what they have and what they have been given.

How do I know if a certain activity will count towards Confirmation Service hours?

To qualify:

Does it fall under the Corporal (or Spiritual) Works of Mercy?

Is it on the list of already approved services listed below?

A good question to ask yourself is, what is the NEED that I am serving? Poverty, Elderly, Disabled, etc...

What are the approved services?

The approved services listed below is not a complete list so if you have questions please contact the Director of Youth Formation and Ministry to verify if the service project will be considered towards Confirmation.

List of approved services (not a complete list)

Love INC (non-fundraising activities)	Helping at a clothing drive
Meals on Wheels	Adopt – A – Grandparent
Feed my Starving Children	Christmas Caroling at a hospital or Nursing Home
